Nursery - weaving

Key Vocabulary

Weaving, over, under, through, weave, thread, yarn, loom

Children can be taught key knowledge and skills by following the steps below:

Adult-led activities:

- Threading beads: Provide children with beads of different shapes, sizes, and colours and ask them to thread them onto string or pipe cleaners. This activity will help develop children's fine motor skills, hand-eye coordination, and concentration.
- Paper plate weaving: Cut slits around the edge of a paper plate and provide children with strips of coloured paper or ribbon to weave through the slits. This activity will help develop children's creativity and fine motor skills.
- Finger knitting: Show children how to finger knit using wool or thick string. This activity will help develop children's fine motor skills and concentration.

Child-led activities:

- Weaving with natural materials: Provide children with natural materials such as leaves, twigs, and feathers and encourage them to weave them together to create a natural art piece. This activity will allow children to explore the different textures and properties of natural materials.
- Ribbon weaving: Provide children with different coloured ribbons and ask them to weave them together using a loom or cardboard frame. This activity will allow children to explore different colours and patterns and develop their fine motor skills.
- Collage weaving: Provide children with different types of paper and encourage them to cut them into strips and weave them together to create a colourful collage. This activity will allow children to develop their creativity and explore different textures and patterns.

Key Skills and Knowledge

Development Matters

Physical development: The child should be able to hold and manipulate the weaving materials, such as threading beads or lacing cards. This will help to develop their hand-eye coordination and fine motor skills. Expressive arts and design: The child should be able to explore

different materials and textures, and make choices about which materials to use. They should also be able to experiment with different patterns and colours.

<u>Communication and language</u>: The child should be able to describe what they are doing and explain their choices when weaving. They should also be able to listen to and follow instructions from adults and peers.

<u>Understanding the world</u>: The child should be able to explore the different materials and tools used in weaving, and understand that they are used to make different patterns and shapes.

<u>Personal, social and emotional development:</u> The child should be able to develop their confidence and self-esteem by creating something through weaving. They should also be able to share their work with others, take turns, and show respect for others' work.

Curriculum Enhancements

<u>Threading:</u> Provide children with large beads or pasta shapes and shoelaces or string. Encourage them to thread the beads onto the string, developing their hand-eye coordination and fine motor skills.

<u>Paper Weaving:</u> Provide children with paper strips in different colours and thicknesses. Encourage them to weave the strips over and under each other to create a pattern. This activity will help to develop their creativity, problem-solving skills, and fine motor skills.

<u>Fabric Weaving:</u> Provide children with a large weaving frame, yarn or ribbon, and fabric strips. Encourage them to weave the fabric strips over and under the yarn to create a woven pattern. This activity will help to develop their creativity, problem-solving skills, and fine motor skills.

Natural Weaving: Provide children with a range of natural materials such as sticks, leaves, and feathers. Encourage them to weave these materials together to create a natural weaving. This activity will help to develop their creativity, fine motor skills, problem-solving skills, and knowledge of the natural world. Textile Weaving: Provide children with a range of textiles such as ribbons, lace, and netting. Encourage them to weave these materials together to create a textile weaving. This activity will help to develop their

<u>Collaborative Weaving:</u> Provide children with a large weaving frame and encourage them to work together to create a collaborative weaving. This activity will help to develop their social skills, teamwork, and communication skills

Possible Misconceptions

Children may not understand the importance of keeping the tension even while weaving. They may pull the threads too tightly or not tightly enough, which can affect the quality of the fabric.

Suggested Activities/Questions
