# **EYFS - Reception - Drawing**

## **Key Vocabulary:**

Fine motor, grip, pencil, pen, circle, line, enclose, curvy, wavy, straight, thick, thin, pick and flick, stories

## **Key Knowledge**

Children can be taught key knowledge by following the steps below:

## Physical Development Steps

- Can use the pick and flick method for holding pencils, pens, crayons, chalk
- Can hold drawing medium with increasing control, using a consistent grip.

#### **Expressive Arts and Design Steps**

- Use a range of materials to draw to understand how different mediums can look
- 2. Know that different drawing materials can make different types of lines and shapes
- 3. Experiment with creating curved, straight, wavy, thick and thin lines using appropriate drawing medium
- 4. Understand that the shapes and lines created can be used to represent their thoughts and events
- 5. Use drawings to tell stories

# **Suggested Activities**

- experiment with a variety of tools for drawing lines, such as pens, pencils, felt tip markers, wax crayons, oil pastels and charcoal, and found objects such as threads, sticks, water from a watering can or a simple computer programme
- draw on a variety of surfaces various colours of paper, card, acetate, textured paper or card, tissue paper, plastic, white boards, blackboards, mirrored paper or found objects like stones and wood

# **Possible Misconceptions**

That the children have a lot of 'cultural capital' to draw upon

That they have lots of imaginative ideas because they are young

That they like art and feel confident in the lessons

# This will lead to . . .

## Year One

- Children begin to explore and develop different techniques involved in drawing such as shading, thick and thin lines, patterns, shapes form and space
- Children are also exposed to using a range of different materials to create
- Pupils should be taught about the work of a range of artists, craft makers and designers, describing the differences and similarities between different practices and disciplines, and making links to their own work.
